PDF Documents

What Is a PDF?

PDF Stands for Portable Document Format

- Non-proprietary Format (can be freely read and distributed)
- Keeps True to Format / Layout of a Print Document
- Cross Platform compatibility



Types of PDF Files

Unstructured

Structured

Tagged

Fully Accessible PDF



What Makes a Accessible PDF File?

- Text available selectable
- Alternative Text defined for all images
- Logical Reading Order
- Document Language Specified
- Tables header rows defined
- Hyperlinks that are descriptive of destination
- Form fields with descriptions and in correct tab order
- Text can viewed without the need to scroll back and forth- Reflow enabled



Why Make Accessible PDFs?

- Accessibility of tagged PDF files available since 2001
- Most current assistive technologies work with tagged pdf
- PDF file format is ubiquitous
- No need for duplication of effort
- Security of Accessible PDF files available
- Universal Design
- PDF may be the best format



Problems with PDF Documents

- PDF files were designed to be printed-Static
- Accessibility not as defined as HTML
 - HTML allows for flexibility Allows for customization
- Standards and tools still in development PDF Universal Accessibility Committee
- Some people who are Blind assume inaccessible and ask for alternative version
- Need special tools to correct accessibility of PDF documents (Acrobat Professional, etc.)
- Retrofitting can be difficult



Setting a Organizational Strategy

- Many people are using the PDF file format
- Accessibility of PDF files has to be considered even it means providing alternative formatted document
- If no retrofitting, setting a date where newly developed PDF files will be accessible
- Support, tools, and advertising of approach towards PDF files
- Organizational approach/policy to when PDF files will be used



Process of Creating Accessible PDFs

- Prepare your documents to create an accessible PDF
- Check your PDF for accessibility
- Correct accessibility problems with Adobe Professional
- Review page for accessibility







- Create Structured Documents

 - Ctrl Alt 1 --- Heading 1
 - Ctrl Alt 2 --- Heading 2
 - Ctrl Alt 3 --- Heading 3











Create Proper Lists





Create Proper Lists





- Format Hyperlinks
 - Highlight information or URL to link
 - Right click on item, choose hyperlink
 - Fill "text to display" with a descriptive link



How to Create an Accessible PDF

- Start with a Well Structured Document
 - Headings
 - Alt Text for Images
 - Proper Lists
 - Links
- Use PDF Maker available with Adobe Standard and Professional – Change Conversion Setting – Be Sure Accessibility is Checked
- DO NOT USE "File Print to PDF"



Creating Accessible PDF's but no Adobe Professional?

- Word 2007 Save as PDF Add-in

- Will still need Adobe Professional for testing and modifying files for accessibility



Tips for Checking PDFs for Accessibility with Acrobat Reader

- Drag cursor over text to see if it can be selected
- In Acrobat Reader, Save As Text (Accessible), open .txt file, check order and whether text makes sense
- Use Read Out Loud to listen to text.
- In a PDF Form, hover the mouse pointer over each form field and check that a label appears as tool tip. Tab to each field and confirm that all content is present and in the right order



Tips for Checking PDFs for Accessibility with Acrobat Reader

- Check to see if the Document is "Tagged" Go to File - Properties - Check Reflow of document
- Hover cursor over each meaningful image and check out if graphic is labeled appropriately with text
- Insure in Document Properties under Security tab that "Content Copying For Accessibility" is "Allowed"
- Do an Accessibility Quick Check- Only checks whether file is tagged



Accessibility Built in to Acrobat Reader

- Reflow
- Zoom To
- Read Out Loud
- Accessibility Setup Assistant
 - High Contrast
 - Set colors used to highlight form fields and required fields
 - Always display keyboard selection cursor
 - Disable Font smoothing
 - Reading Order
 - Display PDF Documents in the web browser
 - Auto-save disabled
 - Reopen documents to last viewed
 - Customize how AT accesses visible pages
 - Override Page Layout Style
 - Override Document Zoom



Adobe Professional Accessibility (Accessible Source Document)

- Run accessibility test
- Change Reading Order
- Change items tagged inappropriately
- Make Image Null Description using Background Image
- Use Table Editor
- Set Security that Permits Accessibility
- Create PDF forms



Adobe Professional Accessibility (Source document Inaccessible)

- Open a document to convert to PDF format
- Check for tags, and Tag a document that hasn't been tagged
- Add Language attribute
- Add Alternative text to an image
- OCR an "image only" scan of a document
- Create accessible links



Accessibility and PDF Tables

- PDF Tables may not be accessible if created within source document
- Table Editor (Adobe Acrobat Pro 9) and Table Inspector (Adobe Acrobat Pro 8) can be used to improve accessibility of tables
- Table Editor (Pro 9) adds more features to associate header cells
- Can add a Table Summary



Accessibility and PDF Forms

- Accessible forms issue same as with HTML in associating label with field
- Can Tag forms with Adobe Acrobat Professional to associate label with fields
- Life Cycle Designer has an accessibility panel to add accessibility to:
 - Text Fields
 - Radio buttons
 - Check Box
 - List or Combo Box
 - Button Controls
 - Tab Order



Testing a Site for Accessibility

- Run a full Accessibility Text
- Assess Reading order
 - Check Order Panel
 - Screen Reader and/or Read outloud feature
 - Save as Text (accessible)



Commonlook (Third Party Alternative)

- Requires Training
- Automates processes in correcting PDF errors
- Simple and Complex Tables
- Form Field tagging
- Tests for 508 Compliance and provides report
