- Creation of the Aging Network
 - Purpose and Programs

Older Americans Act

Title II Aging Network Support	Administration on Aging. Establishes the Administration on Aging, the Aging Network
Title III Community Programs	Grants for State and Community Programs on Aging. Authorizes community supportive services in five different areas
Title V Employment	Community Service Employment for Older Americans.
Title VI Native Americans	Grants for Native Americans.
Title VII Vulnerable Elders	Vulnerable Elder Rights Protection Activities.

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Intersection of aging and disability

It is important to note that livable communities/neighborhoods should be viewed as sustainable communities that offer a good quality of life to all generations and abilities.

They should aim to be:

- Accessible and inclusive
- Aesthetically pleasing and safe (in terms of both traffic and crime), and easy and pleasant to access; and
- A community that offers plenty of services, facilities and open space.

- Future Directions
 - Partnering with the aging network

 - Working with older adults – understanding the social and psychological needs

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Independence alone is not enough if we want to improve the quality of life of older people and tackle exclusion. Everyone, including older people, has the right to participate and continue throughout their lives having meaningful relationships and roles. Older people's vital role and responsibility to help build social capital will become ever more apparent as our society ages.
